2016 ANNUAL REPORT

Summer, 2017

Dear Partner Municipal Leader,

In order to keep you, our partner municipalities and elected leaders, abreast of the complex operations of the Greater Augusta Utility District, we are pleased to present the District's 2016 Annual Report. Inside, you'll find a summary of the previous year's accomplishments and a brief outline of our key projects for 2017.

The Board of Trustees takes very seriously the District's two-fold mission:

- 1. To provide fresh, clean, plentiful water; and
- 2. To remove and treat stormwater and wastewater efficiently and effectively.

The most noticeable change for ratepayers in 2016 was the switch to monthly billing, which has streamlined our cashflow; helped our customers budget better; and made it easier to distribute outreach materials on a timely basis.

No single construction project stood out, but we spent a lot of time, effort and money keeping up with paving projects. This requires extensive research and preparation, and the lowering and then raising of many manholes, catch basins and valves to keep pace with paving operations. Our ultimate goal is that once the roads are newly paved, we won't have to dig them up for many years to come.

We recognize that our top priority is to serve you and your constituents. We thank you for your support over the years, and invite you to get in touch with any of the Board of Trustee members at any time.

2016 HIGHLIGHTS & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Infrastructure / Projects

- Replaced drinking water pipe on Boucher Avenue, and Ward Street in Augusta.
- Installed fence near the new wells on Riverside Drive, funded in part by a \$5,000 wellhead protection grant from the State of Maine.
- Completed design for a new drinking water pipe on Alderwood Drive for construction in 2017.
- Replaced 1,350' of drinking water pipe in Manchester.
- Relined sewer pipes on Eastern Avenue and Old Winthrop Road.
- Rerouted a pipe that used to go through a person's house on Arsenal Street to a better location in the street itself.
- Replaced over 1,300' of pipe on Patterson Street with separated stormwater and sewer pipe.
- Inspected thousands of feet of sewer and stormwater pipe and adjusted dozens of catch basins and manholes.



Process Improvements

- The wastewater treatment plant treated over 1.4 billion gallons of wastewater, an average of 3.15 million gallons per day. The plant removed an average of 93% of oxygen-demanding pollutants and 95% of suspended solids.
- Expenses came in at \$1.4 million, 16% under budget.

Safety / Preparedness

- Held Annual Safety Training in June.
- From 2015 to 2016, the MOD rate dropped from 1.03 to 0.83, saving about \$8,000 in Workers' Compensation Premiums.
- Received a \$2,000 Maine Municipal Association Safety Grant to help pay for Confined Space Training (at right)

Administrative / Financial

- Received a clean audit of 2015 financial statements.
- Added \$1.36 million in capital assets and ended 2016 with \$1.89 million in work in progress.
- Ended 2016 with 662 paperlessbilling customers and 766 onlinepaying customers.
- Monthly billing has helped find leaks on the customer side of the meter more quickly.
- Held annual planning session with GAUD Board of Trustees in January.
- Held annual meeting with City of Augusta in March.



Outreach

- Distributed the Annual Report, Annual Drinking Water Quality Report, and a Currents newsletter.
- Delivered regular statement stuffers informing customers of key issues, accomplishments and best practices for drinking water and wastewater users.







OUR FUNDAMENTAL GOALS, EVERY YEAR:

- 1. Supply enough clean, safe drinking water to meet the needs of the communities we serve.
- 2. Provide adequate fire protection.
- 3. Remove storm and wastewater efficiently and effectively.
- 4. Maintain stable and equitable rates.
- Continually improve the District's financial systems to ensure reliability, transparency and security.
- 6. Comply with all regulatory permits.
- 7. Always communicate clearly, courteously and effectively.

KEY 2017 PROJECTS

There is, as always, a lot of paving work that we'll need to react to, as well as these specfic projects:

- We are designing a replacement for a sewer pipe that failed underneath the Kennebec River.
- We will install new sewer and stormwater pipe in the Greenlief/Morse/Gannett area.
- We will replace old drinking water pipe on Commercial Street and North Belfast Avenue.
- We will modify some stormwater systems to improve chronic drainage problems.

To accomplish all this, one of our key equipment needs will be to replace one of our old backhoes.
